Coinciding with National Domestic Violence Awareness Month and Financial Literacy Month (FLM). During the month of November, the Canadian Center for Women's Empowerment (CCFWE) is raising awareness on economic abuse and recognizes November 26th Economic Abuse Awareness Day (EAAD).

Now in its second year, <u>#HelpUsRise2021</u> is a national advocacy and awareness campaign to educate Black, Indigenous, and Persons of Colour (BIPOC) survivors, financial institutions, and policymakers about the different economic challenges faced by survivors of domestic violence. Our goal is to work together to amplify the impact of Economic Abuse efforts through consistent messaging.

INTRODUCTION

We are launching a national campaign in November to educate survivors, financial institutions, and policymakers about the different economic challenges faced by survivors of domestic violence, the prevalence of financial abuse, and the costs of recovery, stigma, unemployment,

and coercive debt. Knowing what economic abuse is, can help prevent it. We want to provide people with information to identify and respond to it.

CCFWE's 2021 campaign theme is <u>"Championing Financially Strong Futures for Survivors."</u> We choose this uplifting message due to the reason that we are dedicated to not only supporting survivors of economic abuse but also empowering survivors to envision a successful and independent future.

<u>Economic abuse</u> is a pattern of control, exploitation, or sabotage of money, finances, and economic resources (car, food, education, transportation). It affects an individual's capacity to acquire, use and maintain economic resources and threatens their economic security and self-sufficiency. Economic abuse is experienced by women from all backgrounds, regions, and income levels. Women from marginalized groups, including Black, racialized, and Indigenous women, are at a higher risk of economic abuse.

Now more than ever it is important to protect women from economic abuse. A recent study conducted by CCWFE revealed that economic abuse increased as a result of COVID-19. Learn more about our research findings <u>https://ccfwe.org/research/</u>

Week 1: Awareness on Economic Abuse and Financial Literacy:

Week 2: Policy and System Change and Coercive Debt:

- Coerced debt and bad credit scores often prevent survivors from securing housing in the short and long terms. It can make it more difficult to get a credit card, student loan, line of credit, car loan, and potentially a job loss due to screening by some employers. - All stakeholders including the government, financial institutions, the justice system, utility companies, landlords, academic institutions must take action. They all have a role to play in combating Economic Abuse. Policy and system change is key to ending Economic Abuse, and we need your voice to make a difference. Sign our <u>pledge</u> to fight Economic Abuse and become an advocate for Economic Justice within your social circles and local communities.

Week 3: Protect Black, Indigenous, People of Color from Economic Abuse:

- Economic Abuse can happen to anyone, and it's likely happening to someone close to you. Black, Indigenous, racialized, newcomers, and immigrant women are more vulnerable to Economic Abuse. Many survivors do not seek support because of barriers such as language or culture. - We believe that financial institutions have a large role to help survivors of economic abuse by offering services such as interest-deferred payments, flexible repayment options, and other personal banking alternatives. CCFWE prepared policy recommendations for the Financial Consumer Agency of Canada which details the steps and procedures banking staff must take to properly assess, prevent, and protect survivors of Financial Abuse. Week 4: National Economic Abuse Awareness Day, and the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence

- In honor of the upcoming <u>#16DaysofActivism against Gender-Based Violence</u>, the Canadian Center for Women's Empowerment (CCFWE) in collaboration with our international partners across four continents (United Kingdom, Australia, and New Zealand) will be sharing 16 survivor stories of economic abuse around the world from November 25th to December 10th to raise awareness of the immense impact that economic abuse has on a global scale. Economic Abuse is a seldom-talked-about yet prevalent issue faced by survivors of domestic violence in Canada. More than 94% of women who experience intimate partner violence also experience some form of Economic Abuse. Bank customers, especially women, who seek loans from banks or who present to banks with high levels of financial stress might well be victims of economic abuse.

To be able to support and help victims and survivors, and to prevent domestic violence in the future, we all need to talk about it. And to talk about domestic violence, we need others to fully understand what it is.

As a supporter of domestic violence victims and survivors, we need you to help us spread the word this November during National Economic Abuse Awareness Day (November 26th, 2021).
